Molecules of Protein Change Into Something Living, Scientists Told

DISEASE FOUND

NEW CAUSE OF

A new cause of discuse, found in molecules of protein, which change from inert, lifeless crystals into something apparently living, was reported to the American Association for the Advancement of

Science at Atlantic City Tuesday. The proteins were found by Dr. W. M. Stanley of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, and fellow scientists, in tobacco spinach, tomatoes and phiox. In the plants they all cause "mosalc,"

a costly spotted leaf disease. Heretofore the "mosaic" diseases have been attributed to "viruses," to pleces. which were generally likened to sub-microscopic bacteria. Dr. Stanley said his evidence goes far to show that proteins are able to alter themselves and become disease pro ducers, and that such wild proteins are probably the "viruses." Human beings are afflicted with

diseases whose "virus" unseen causes have been as mystifying as fair. the plant "viruses." The Rocke-feller scientists think the human "viruses" may prove similar to the plant "viruses." The Rocke

HEIRESS LEAPS 18 STORIES TO DEATH

Note Identifies Her As Girl Who Disappears From Connecticut

(By Associated Fress) NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—Elizabeth Butterfield, Minneapolis depart-ment store heiress who had been missing since last Tuesday, plunged to her death from an 18th floor hotel window today after pausing first to take spiritual consolation from the Bible. Jronically, it developed that she

had been living at the Hotel Bar-bizon-Plaza under an assumed name since the day after her disappearance while from another hotel, the Gotham, only four blocks away, her distraught aunt had directed a widespread search for her. The 28-year-old orphan, who suffered a nervous breakdown three months ago, left a note in

her room saying: "Please notify police in case of accident. I am Elizabeth Butterlield."


